TOPIC: RAM House Moving to a New Venue in Old Southwest **PRESENTERs:**

--Overview of Roanoke Area Ministries (RAM House), an interfaith nonprofit that advocates for those facing or threatened by homelessness and hunger. Founded in 1971, doors are open for those needing care coordination, day shelter services, meals, and financial assistance. --Share Plan About Their Relocation: RAM is currently located in OSW on Campbell Avenue and is moving to 410 Elm Avenue.

--Context: Ali Hamed-Moore lives in OSW on King George Avenue (since 2016) with her wife and three children (two teenagers and one first grader at Highland Park Elementary). She also works at Anderson Treatment as the Chief Compliance Officer. Her office is located in their facility at 404 Elm Avenue, SW, where they serve people who have substance use disorder and other co-occurring medical and behavioral health conditions. Ali says, "I love the OSW neighborhood and especially appreciate raising my children in a place with economic diversity and social services that take care of our neighbors."

NOTES about RAM House Operation:

- RAM House in business 53years
- Serves about 200 lunches daily (mostly to seniors who pick up to take home) and 45 clients for other services
- Open 8-4, then closed very strict about clients hanging around after closing
- Financial aid program that is primarily privately funded
- This year, RAM has taken 54 people out of rehab and put them into the structure of Oxford House
- Last year, RAM helped housed 145 people (inc. 30 children)
- 77% increase of "emergency sheltered people" in the last year
- Roanoke needs to set things up now to avoid crises like we've seen in other cities
- Current location has some problems:
 - High ceilings are an environmental issue with noise/echoing/privacy
 - No room for real showers forcing clients to take bird baths
 - No on-site clinical services to allow providers to come to RAM and their clients
- OSW has existing problems with folks sleeping outside RAM wants to provide services to *reduce homelessness in OSW*
- Current substance abuse issue is a different beast from times previous
 - Many folks are profoundly affected beyond a 12-step program
 - RAM provides an important first step of protection for people able to get help
- Transportation is a primary issue to enable people to get to lodging, medical, food, and support all over town
 - $\circ~$ RAM is providing bus passes to address this need
- RAM has a strong precedent of maintaining a controlled environment in the immediately surrounding neighborhood

QUESTIONS:

- Q: I firmly believe in this work. Bringing a few things concerns: Average property price is north of \$450k. These are houses that represent many neighbors' primary financial resource and plans for retirement. Concerned about mismanagement that might affect property values. It's very important the clients are provided with transportation to get back to where they are being housed to discourage after-hours loitering. Will there be adequate staff to have crowd and queue control, considering the near-zero front lot line in the new location?
 - A: This is managed at the current location. There is no outside queue. People enter the building to get meals (at the back door on the alley), and many people pick up their food and take it home.
- Q: Where will people park with the little existing parking nearby?
 - A: Parking on the street is very temporary as people grab food and go. The new location also has two parking lots off the alley near 4th Street.
- Q: Concerns about bringing additional panhandling and issues in the area.
 - A: Statistically, opening a well-run shelter in an area, decreases crime and similar concerns

- Q: Further concerns around crowd control. What resources will RAM provide to support clients getting back to where they need to be? There needs to be a holistic plan. NOTE: this was taken under advisement. Currently they provide bus passes on the city buses, but looking into a shuttle and other solutions.
- Q: The important thing is that these are our community members. We're opening a dialog to work together in the future.
- A: 200+ people who come for lunch are senior citizens, low income who are hungry (children). Day client count is only about 45.
- The "wrap-around services" the RAM team is discussing is key to a successful enterprise.

- oIn need of assistance with volunteer recruitment, assignments/time slots.
- o 3 homeowners need volunteer docents for both tour days. We need a minimum of 1 docent per house both days, but 2 or more would be ideal. Docents are needed to help with foot traffic in the homes, answering questions, directing flow, covering for homeowners if they need a restroom break. Their help keeping people from walking out with priceless heirlooms, using the restroom, bringing in snacks or strollers, etc. also very appreciated.
- Ticket Sales volunteers will help with delivering brochures and wristbands, taking payment for day of tickets.
- Docents and ticket sales volunteers can work whole 4 hour time blocks, or 2 hour (Sat 5-7, 7-9; Sun 1-3, 3-5).
